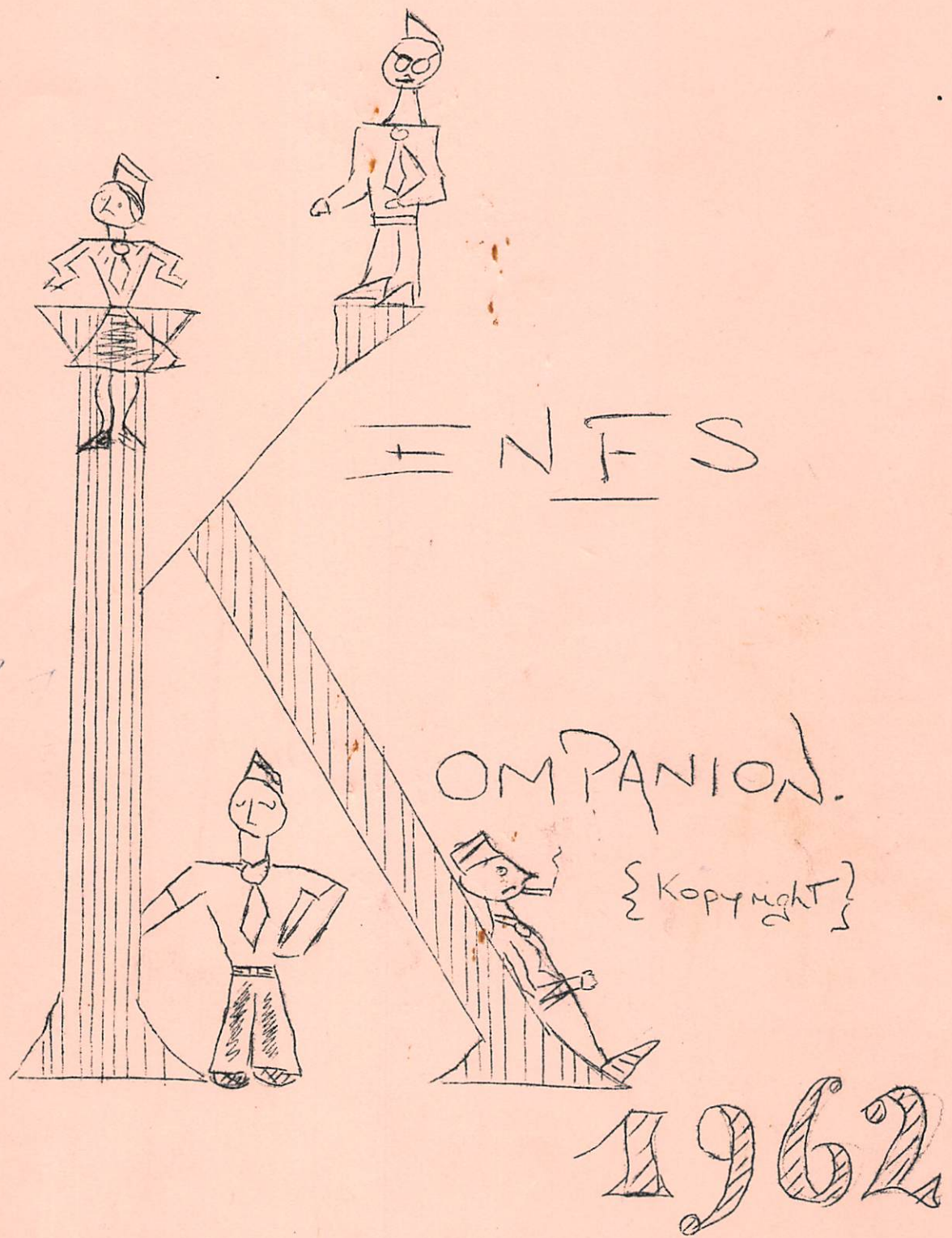

AIM: Find these numbers.

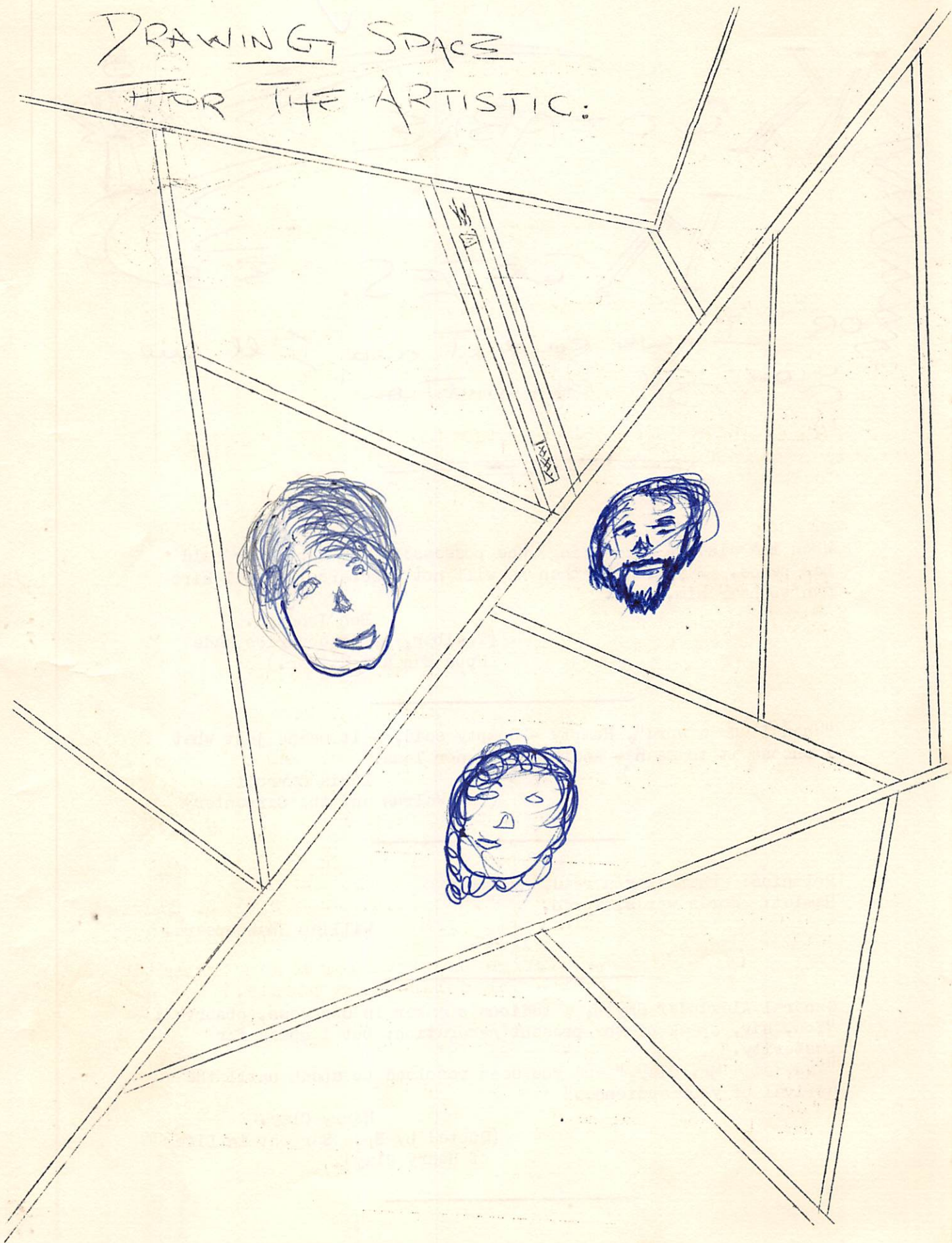
NOTE: Each similar letter represents one number only.

Tips for inexperienced  
Kenes - Goers

[Being a new edition of Maimonides' monumental work, "Guide for the Perplexed"]

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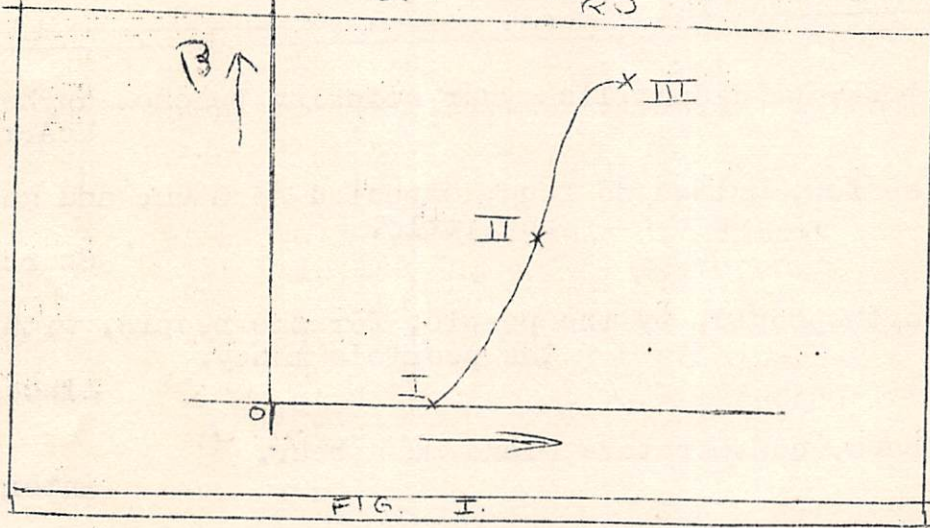

- VIEWS AND OPINIONS -

Q3 ARE WE IN BETTER WASTING OUR TIME?

This question is answered with the aid of calculus

LET  $\beta = \frac{\beta}{RU} \cdot 2\omega T$   
THEN  $\frac{d\beta}{dt} = \frac{\beta}{RU} \cdot 2\omega$



I  $\frac{\beta}{RU} \cdot 2\omega$  is a minimum (see plot of function)

II  $\frac{\beta}{RU} \cdot 2\omega$  is steep and has only a large gradient,

It follows that  $\frac{d\beta}{dt}$  is large  
and  $\frac{d\beta}{dt} \rightarrow \infty$

III If  $\frac{\beta}{RU} \cdot 2\omega$  is a maximum,  
 $\frac{d\beta}{dt} = 0$

IV A special case exists between I and II  
Here  $\frac{d\beta}{dt} \rightarrow \frac{\partial\beta}{\partial\tau}$

This partial case is unpredictable  
and as  $\lim_{\rightarrow\infty} \frac{\partial\beta}{\partial\tau} = \frac{d\beta}{dt}$

and is of rather high value

Explanation of mathematical meaning  
to the layman

$\beta = \beta \tau \alpha$ ;  $\tau = \text{time}$   
 $dt = \text{waste of time}$ ;  $U = \text{you}$ ;  $R = \text{are}$   
 $W = \text{work}$

Hence  $\frac{\beta}{RU} \cdot 2W$  — are you in  $\beta \tau \alpha$  do work

In I, the answer to the stated problem is  
"a minimum" (see calculations), and this  
is an important and much occurring case.

In II, we find that  $\frac{d\beta}{dt}$  is of large value,  
and consequently, a great waste of time is  
involved. This case, as in I, is frequent, and  
to be deplored as much in  $\beta \tau \alpha$ .

III is the ideal case, where the answer to  
the stated problem is "a maximum", and  
 $\frac{d\beta}{dt} = 0$ , and no time is wasted.

To complicate the case, we find example IV. Here  
 $\frac{\partial\beta}{\partial\tau}$  is partial, and, through past experience, we  
find that a corollary is that  $\frac{d\beta}{dt}$  is great, and  
usually a great waste of time is subsequently involved.

Working in the 3rd column, we see that E plus 0 equals N. i.e. there will be no 1 carried on to the next column; therefore S plus 1 equals 10. i.e. S equals 9.

4. We now have:

9 E N D  
          1 O R E  
          1 O N E Y.

From the above, it may be seen that E plus 0 equals N, or E equals N. But, remembering that no two dissimilar numbers can have the same value, then this cannot be. Therefore there must be one carried from the previous column. Therefore we can now say: E plus 1 equals N Or N minus 1 equals E.

From the fourth column, N plus R equals E. With further examination we find that N can equal 3,4,5,6,7 or 8 and E can equal 2,3,4,5,6, or 7.

Explanation: N cannot equal 0, 1 or 9 (because of dissimilar numbers theorem). N cannot equal 2 otherwise E would equal 1 which it cannot (from the said theorem).

Again, from column 4, substitute any of the previously mentioned numbers for R and N. We can see that the only combination of numbers when N nearly equals E plus 1 is when R equals 8. (With R equals 9 N would be equal to E plus 1, but S equals 9; therefore we must take the next best, so R equals 8.)

If we add 1 to N plus 8, we would achieve the same result as having N plus 9. Let us take this 1 from a previous column (5). Therefore in column five, D plus E must equal 12 or more. (It cannot equal 11 as already M equals 1.)

5. Remembering that E could equal 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 or 7, let us try E equals 2. Therefore D must equal 9 which it cannot since S already does. Therefore E equals 2 is not a solution

6. Try E equals 3. Therefore D must equal 8 or 9. This does not equal 12 or more, so E equals 3 is not a solution.

7. Try E equals 4, D equals 8; therefore N equals 5.  
But R equals 8; therefore E equals 4 is not a solution.

8. Try E equals 5, N equals 6, D equals 7. This at last works and we have:

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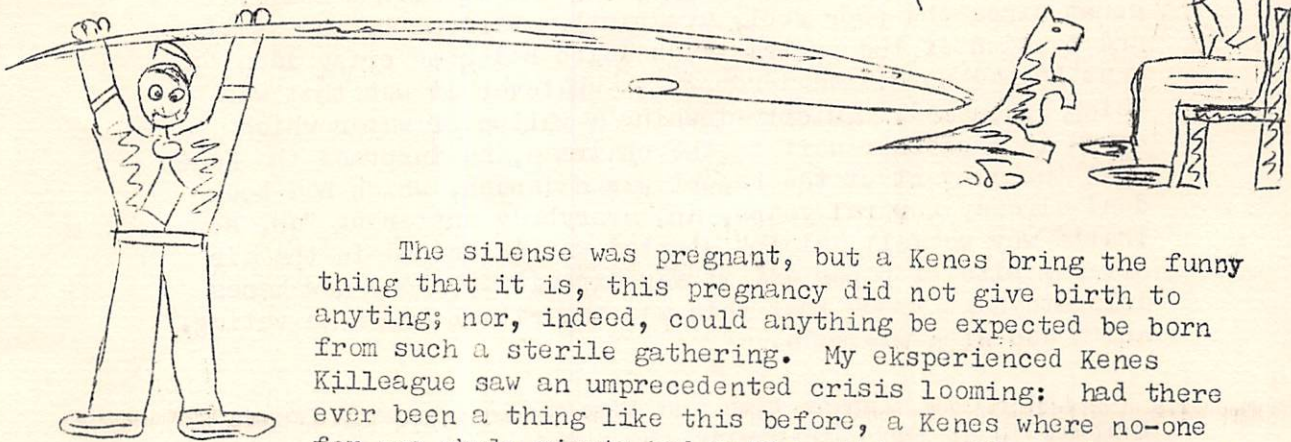
